



Gifting the Child's Play tactile books

- These books can be gifted along with a Bookbug Bag or at any time

- Contact the administrative team at your local Health Service to ensure Health Visitors know about the books
- These books contain high-contrast images, tactile features and Braille-style numbering. They are suitable for children with any kind of additional need.

Key messages for gifting the books

Please share these messages with families:

- Encourage your child to take an active role in exploring the story through touching the textures and looking at the bright illustrations.
- Don't worry about getting to the end. Share a cuddle while you turn the pages back and forth and go at a pace that suits you both.
- Again! Repeat the story as many times as your child likes.
- Use toys, music or other props to help bring the story to life.
- Hearing your voice and sharing a book will support your child's communication skills. Watch their reactions to see what they like best.
